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

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Moderator Speaks - Use your power wisely

Homily given at Naparima College 2009 Graduation

n Micah, Chapter 3, the writer expresses disappointment as regards the leadership methods which were being used during his time. He was dissatisfied with leaders from every sphere including religious leaders.

He witnessed the abuse of power by rulers and prophets, in an effort to make a sharp contrast between what was being practiced and what ought to have been practiced, he said "But as for me, I am filled with power, with the spirit of the Lord and with justice and might."

Naparima College has produced notable graduates – a just and noble president, wise individuals who have been part of the justice system, doctors of world class and standard,

agriculturists and environmentalists, artists and sculptors, dramatists and radio broadcasters, sportsmen, writers, poets and educators and the list goes on and on.

These have been truly powerful people and I suggest to you today that each one of you has the capacity to become a powerful individual. However as you aim towards becoming powerful individuals, some fundamental guestions have to be addressed.

1. How is power defined?

For some, "power is the capacity to influence by coercion". By coercion, I mean manipulation to a desired end. This can take the form of policy positions, legislation and the abuse of democratic processes that are void of transparency. It can also manifest itself in the creation of a dependency culture where freedom is stifled and expression and dialogue hindered.

On the other hand, some define power to mean "the capacity to influence by love". And here by the use of the word, love, we imply "an extension of self for the growth and development of all". You will have to choose therefore, the way you defined power for it will determine

whether or not we make a difference in a country where we are singing, chanting, praying and hoping that better days are coming.

2. Another question that we have to address is, "what is the purpose of this power"?

The purpose of power is to empower. To empower means to create a community of leaders, a community of equals, a community where justice is not relativised based on who is defining it. The purpose of power in our context is to create a unanimous voice that echoes the sound of nationhood where every voice is melodious in spite of the string from which it is played. By that I mean, imputing dignity in all the tasks and functions people perform and by establishing processes by which people can become the best at what they do.

3. A final question that we need to address as we aim towards becoming powerful individuals is, "How would you know that you had been truly powerful?

You would have been truly powerful, when your ideology and philosophy would not have been confined to when you were in office. Your worth would not have been limited to the chair upon which you sat. You would continue to have the power to influence as long as you live and even after. Thus the world will continue to be inspired and influenced by powerful beings who have walked the earth – Jesus of Nazareth, Mother Theresa, Mahatma Ghandi, Martin Luther King and Nelson Mandela.

You the Graduating Class will make all the difference. You are and you will be holders of power. How will you define it?




Editorial: Rise up on wings as eagles

take this opportunity to congratulate the Planning Committee of the Board of Youth Affairs' for a splendid job in organizing the National Presbyterian Youth Convention held on Saturday 24th October 2009 at the Himalaya Club in Barataria. It was obvious to all that a lot of planning and hard work went into this event. The crowd of approximately seven hundred youth, parents, leaders and church workers reacted with enthusiasm and fervor and were obviously enjoyed the camaraderie and fellow-

ship. Needless to say the praise and worship songs were infectious and encouraged by our ecumenical friend, the Rev. Nicole Ashwood (Jamaica, CANACOM), with a little help from student minister, Mr. Colin Lezama. Indeed, the church was untied! The Convention was the climax of a series of smaller youth gatherings held at the Pastoral Region level which, also was effective in mobilizing our church's youth. Kudos to those who planned at this level

There was one striking feature that needs to be highlighted. Almost all the young people who planned, led or participated in the various segments were all students enrolled in University or other post-secondary institution. For example, of the two liturgical dancers one graduated from UWI on Saturday 31st October 2009, while the other is a 2nd Year Medical Student. They represent a growing number of young people within the PCTT who continue to keep church (and Jesus) an important part of their lives, in spite of tough study regimens. This augers well for the future leadership of the PCTT. This observation is not meant to disregard the efforts of young people who enter the workforce right after High School. The point is that our young people are becoming more educated and more aware of local and global issues. They now need



I believe that we are in an exciting time in our church's history. We are finally becoming an indigenous church! Led by our youth, we are re-discovering ourselves as God's people who have unique gifts for ministry.

I am of the belief that our young people can hold their own at any international ecumenical youth event. Over the past seven years or so, some of our young people have represented the PCTT at regional and international events and have even taken leadership roles at these forums. So maybe it's time that BOYA through the Synod link up with the World Student Christian Federation (WSCF). The WSCF is over a hundred years old and is one of the precursors of the World Council of Churches. The WSCF has also nurtured many youth who eventually become world ecumenical leaders. Our secondary schools do well academically. The WSCF can provide many more opportunities for ecumenical growth for our youth.

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Take time to be Holy

hen does 2009 end? Well, on midnight of December 31 of course. But if you look at some other religions you would discover Sept 19 was the beginning of the Jewish New Year, October 18-19 beginning of the Hindu New Year, and December 18 will be the beginning of the Islamic New Year.

In the Jewish calendar we are in the year 5770. The Islamic calendar is dated from 622 C.E. the year the prophet Muhammad made the Hajj to Medina...

Bu there is another important question for the Christian to consider. When does the Liturgical Year 2009 end? It ends on November 22 with the celebration of Christ the King. The new Liturgical Year 2010 begins on November 29 with the celebration of the First Sunday of Advent. We prepare ourselves during the Advent period of four weeks for the coming of the Child Jesus. Even though the malls are shouting to us to begin our Christmas shopping from the beginning of November, we first mark the Advent Season and then the Christmas Season.

Perhaps you are among those who think all of this is not relevant to preaching the Word as the Spirit leads. But you see we live in time, time lives in us and all of us note time. Time is also taking its toll on our bodies and senses. We also spend time and waste time. The hymn writer invites us to "Take time to be holy" and I also suggest 'take time as holy.' In the Bible there are festivals the Israelites are commanded to celebrate. These are to be celebrated so that generations would not forget the religious history of the nation, the blessings of a God of Salvation and a God of Mercy and Forgiveness. The devout Jews have special


prayers and blessings for every special need and event. There are also prayers for daily use, for example when you leave home and when you return.

Let us think about our Sunday Worship. It's the Lord's Day not the traditional Sabbath .The Sabbath is the day of rest, reflection and it ends with thankfulness and joy. It reminds one that God 'rested' from His work of Creation and thus it is a sanctified day. But it is a reminder that time is holy, and thus when the Sabbath is observed one is really emphasizing the fact that God gives every day as a gift. 

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S.P.C.S.O. Celebrates its 10th Anniversary

ne Saturday morning in June, 1999, a group of curious, young strangers were gathered in the Church Hall at Susamachar Presbyterian Church. We were all there for the same reason. We had heard, by various ways that, there was a pan class starting in the church.



We started from the very basics of music and steelpan, using only a blackboard and 2 tenor pans, one of them being George's own pan. Slowly but surely, we progressed from playing the scale, C major to Yellow Bird and other songs. Within a few short months, a room full of strangers who were learning to play a musical instrument was transformed into a band of friends playing sweet songs on steelpans, who today are a family. We were all eager to share our newfound way of praising God through music, with the congregation, and on Sunday the 3rd October, 1999, the SPCSO was officially launched. That morning, the steelpans were set up on the chancel at the very front of the church. Following the launching and dedication, a group of 12 scared musicians took their places behind the various instruments and we bravely played "Joyful Joyful We Adore Thee" which was loudly applauded by the congregation. This gave us the encouragement to continue God's work.

Immediately, practice every Sunday morning and playing for monthly communion became the norm for the band. We had only played for communions until 2000 when Rev. Joy asked us to play for her wedding and the reception at St. Michaels. Before long, we were playing for other special church services, Christmas pageants, weddings, and also for other churches. Also in 2000, we played for the Presbyterian Convention in the Centre of Excellence. This was by far, the largest gathering of people we had ever played for. Throughout the years, we have also lent a hand to our fellow musicians within the community who have hosted concerts and other shows. Most notably, we were part of the musical repertoire of the concert 'No Greater Love' put on by the Southern Presbyterian Chorale. The experience of being in such a production pushed us to aspire to become better musicians.

Apart from these, we have also been in the recording studio 4 times in order to capture the beauty and versatility of our music. The first time was in 2000, where the SPCSO, together with other musical groups of this church

compiled the CD, "Inspirations", a Sacred Liturgy. A mere 2 years after our inception we had risen to the challenge of producing the high quality of music fit to be recorded. In 2003, we launched the CD "Nostalgic Melodies", which sought to capture the soft, soothing and relaxing side of our

music. This also provided the foundation for our playing at weddings and other events where contemporary music was more suitable. In 2005, we launched "Praises on Steel". This CD was meant for the listener to meditate on praising God. It brought the sounds of church into the homes of the congregation members. Lastly, or most recent production was "For Our Friends At Christmas Time" in 2007. This captured the sweet, innocent sounds of Christmas time in a way that could only be portrayed on steelpan. Each CD has been the culmination of many months of hard work and dedicated practice. The hours were long both before, during and after the recording sessions but it all paid off in the end, in seeing your delight in these.

At this, the 10th anniversary of the SPCSO, we truly have a lot to be thankful for. Firstly we must thank God for all his countless mercies that he has bestowed on the band. We are continued to be blessed to reach where we are today. Next, we must say kudos and congratulations to George for having the insight and taking the initiative to guide us to where we are today. Also, the band would not have started if not for Rev. Joy. She helped this revolutionary idea become a reality and for this we would always be grateful. Additionally, the band would not have been able to continue our mission in music without the guidance of the various ministers of Susamachar Presbyterian Church. We also need to acknowledge Mr. Glenn Sookhoo, Chairman and the members of the Local Board of this church. Their continued support and direct assistance have helped us to grow from a single tenor pan to this vibrant band you see in front you today. Lastly, but very importantly, we must thank you the loving and encouraging congregation who have supported us every step of the way. From that first Sunday in October 1999 to today 2009, you have always been our number one fans. Your continued support in every venture we undertake, CDs concerts and even church services like these is greatly appreciated. Also, your kind words of encouragement mean so much to us.

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Aramalaya clears the Air on proposed A-CARE Centre

Correction of Article -New Visions: Kirkpatrick Park, Tunapuna

he Aramalaya Pastoral Region would like to set the record straight regarding an article published on page 17 of the September 2009 issue of The Trinidad Presbyterian entitled "New Visions: Kirkpatrick Park, Tunapuna".

This article, the contents of which are also in scores of e-mails and flyers, was evidently printed by The Trinidad Presbyterian in error from an unsolicited e-mail that is being bombarded into many inboxes. The sender, Ms. Sally Rampersad a.k.a. Sally Radford HAS NOT received any approval from any PCTT body to construct any facility on church lands in the Tunapuna area or elsewhere. Ms. Rampersad has ignored PCTT polity in promoting her "project". To date she has never provided any blueprint, any financial planning documents, or identified any project team to any PCTT body. In many other opinioned letters and e-mails she has also claimed to be pursuing other similar "projects". Ms. Rampersad resides in the UK and attends services at the Aramalaya Presbyterian Church during her brief stays in Trinidad.

For the record the authorized facility being pursued is the Aramalaya Communal Assisted Retiree Embrace (or A-CARE) Centre. This facility will be a home and activity centre for senior citizens on PCTT lands on Cochrane Street in Tunapuna. Ms. Rampersad is not on the project team for this project. The A-CARE project has progressed within the protocols of the system of approval under which the PCTT operates. It been intently discussed by the Aramalaya congregation and has already received the written approval of the Aramalaya Session, the Northern Presbytery and the Synod. A comprehensive 30 page booklet outlining all facets of the project has been produced and is being channeled for the ongoing review of all stakeholders. It includes 5 pages of blueprints and details on project objectives, management structure, staffing and of course budgeting.

The Chairman of the 14 member A-CARE project team is Mr. Ralph Sampath and includes specialists in various fields, including project management, social services, financing, and of course construction. As requested by the Synod, it also includes 2 representatives from the Northern Presbytery.

The A-CARE facility will consist of two buildings of three levels and will include 38 apartments with en suite kitchenette and toilet/bath, a mini-mart, coffee shop, library, internet café, a laundry and a medical attendant bay. All levels will have elevator access and all 38 apartments will have a window to the outside. The ground level will have an internal street and garden. Particular care is being un-

dertaken to ensure that pleasant communal, recreational and ethical living conditions are achieved. The centre will also be used to provide wellness, spiritual, physical therapy, walk-in adult education and other skills enhancement activities. Needless to state, there is already a large demand for occupancy.

With a floor area of 23,818 square feet and a construction cost of \$1,083.21 p.s.f. the facility is estimated to cost \$25.8 million dollars. Like any project of this size and nature all financing details and operating costs are being acutely planned, managed and reported. Even gratuity for staff has already been budgeted. The Division of Aging, Ministry of Social Development, Culture and Gender Affairs of the Government of Trinidad and Tobago (GOTT) has been consulted on this project and is extremely interested in the output of the A-CARE Project team, as it is their desire to use this facility as a model for future similar government projects. The GOTT will also be assisting with financing.

Members, adherents and friends of the PCTT are warned to distant themselves from any "building project" pursued by Ms. Sally Rampersad a.k.a. Ms. Sally Radford, particularly when it comes to the solicitation of funds - There IS NO Kirkpatrick Park facility or any other building project approved or even under any consideration by any PCTT body to which Ms. Sally Rampersad is a prime affiliate.

We truly hope that from Hillview they will face the world with visions new!



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A Tribute to Dr. Elizabeth Rosabelle Seesaran

Eulogy by Harrack Balramsingh, Chairman, Citizens for a Better Trinidad and Tobago (CBTT) at the Funeral Service for Dr. Rosabelle Seesaran held at the Susamachar Presbyterian Church on October 20, 2009

hen I was told of the passing of Dr. Rosabelle Seesaran, a wave of sorrow swept over me for I realised that in this world I had lost a very dear friend. My mind reverted to those great words of the Apostle, and they are words which truly can be spoken of Dr. Seesaran: "I have fought the good fight, I have kept the faith, I have finished the course."

During her illness, she lost her nephew Scott Zoba whom she regarded as her son. This brought tears to her eyes on her deathbed but as a good and genuine Christian, she never lost faith in God. Reflecting on her nephew's death and her own ill-health she said like Job did: "I had nothing when I was born. And I will have nothing when I die. God gave many things to me. Now, God has taken these things from me. But I will still praise God."

Dr. Elizabeth Rosabelle Bernice Seesaran is living proof that you are never too old to learn. After a teaching career and marriage that spanned almost four decades, she returned to the University of the West Indies to successfully complete her doctoral thesis. Having graduated from UWI in July 1996, this exceptional woman earned the right to add the title "Doctor" before her name.

For her it was the realisation of a dream nurtured by her father Francis Sampath, that his eight children would excel in their pursuit of academic excellence, as well as an opportunity to leave behind a legacy for the generations to come. Her father's dream was for her to become a medical doctor. For various reasons he was unable to accomplish his dream, but he and his wife, the late Amelia Lucky Sampath instilled in all their children the desire to aim at the highest academic standard.

Through her four brothers who pursued medical careers, Doctors Martin, Roy, Hugh and Angus Sampath, her father, a school principal, lived his dream. Fascinated, like her father, with education, her entire career and life was punctuated with her pursuit for higher learning whether it was her BA honors Degree in History at Mc Gill's University, MA in History, Diploma in Education and Diploma in Social Studies at UWI, St. Augustine, Diploma in Theology at Caracas, a one-year scholarship to the United Kingdom in Infant School Teaching Methods, or some other type of education course.

This unfulfilled passion for excellence, coupled with her career, domestic life and the numerous charitable organisations and church positions in which she served, kept her occupied for most of her life and prevented her from achieving her goal. However, with the death of her husband in 1985, retirement as Principal 11 in 1986 and a life of loneliness on the horizon, she was spurred on to finally pursue her dream. After her husband, Isaac Deoraj Seesaran died in 1985, she had to decide what to do in life. She wanted a new vision for the future because she had to live alone. She prayed about it and after a while she felt she should retire from teaching.

She stayed on at Siparia Junior Secondary School until 1986, then left for a tour to India and returned some time later with the firm conviction that she was going to pursue her doctorate in History. She applied to UWI, St. Augustine and was accepted. Then she started doing research from about 1990 and finally her thesis was accepted and was awarded the degree in 1995. At the graduation exercise, Dr. Seesaran was the oldest graduate but the proudest of them all when she received her scroll from the Chancellor of the University, Sir Shridath Ramphal. Her accomplishments inspired a number of older men and women to return to school and university.

Her thesis represented years of diligent work, persistence and application in a programme of research in which she had no colleagues except herself, but she emerged stronger because of that loneliness. She displayed great pride for having made an original contribution to knowledge. Her thesis, "Social Mobility in the Indo-Trinidadian Community 1870 – 1917" was published. The thesis examined the process by which a middle class emerged among the Indian immigrants in Trinidad, their upward mobility through, among other things, the accumulation of cash, land and education. Dr. Seesaran always wanted to know more about our people, how they settled and advanced in society. She always said that she enjoyed her thesis because it gave her the opportunity to deliver into another world.

The idea came about following a journey to the Far East and her exposure to the Japanese tradition and ancestral worship. She felt that a similar journey into the background of her people, highlighting their accomplishments, would somehow inspire the younger generation to preserve some of what they have. She is also the author of several articles published in various journals and a book, "From Caste to Class" depicting the Social Mobility of the Indo-Trinidadian Community from 1870-1917.

Dr. Seesaran dedicated her entire life to helping others. She never had children of her own, but by establishing the Trinidad and Tobago Association for Retarded Children School in Penal (TTARC), she had been mother to hundreds of children.

She served for many years on the various Boards and Committees of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago and was an Honorary Elder of the Penal Congregation and an honorary adviser to its Girls' Work Board. For more than a decade, she was on the Board of Education at the Integrated Education Project of SERVOL where along with the staff of the school, we organised the first Annual Drug Awareness week in schools in Trinidad and Tobago. She also served as an executive member of Citizens for a Better Trinidad and Tobago (CBTT) for many years and was Chairperson of the Republic Day Award Committee which selected outstanding citizens for the National Republic Day Award of Trinidad and Tobago.

Dr. Seesaran was a founder of the Church Women United in Trinidad and Tobago as well as the Penal Breakfast Centre Association which, until the advent of the Schools' Nutrition Company, supplied free lunches to the needy children of the schools in the Penal environment. She was also a Life Member of the Association for the Mentally Retarded Children of T&T.

She obtained her early education at St. Gabriel's R.C. School in San Fernando and later at St. Joseph's Covent and Naparima Boys' College which was the only school in the area offering Advanced levels. She started working as a teacher at Penal Presbyterian School where she met her husband of 35 years. That was the start of a teaching career that spanned over 42 years. She taught in schools such as

Grant Memorial Presbyterian, Naparima Girls' High School, lere High School, Penal Junior Secondary School and Siparia Junior Secondary School.

She also taught at the University of the West Indies School of Continuing Education in San Fernando and amazingly came back in her seventies to work as a contract teacher at the Siparia Junior Secondary School. By now you must be wondering why this outstanding citizen never received a national award.

Dr. Seesaran was one of the most amazing people I had ever met and would probably ever meet. She spent her life caring for others. She would often go out of her way to reach those who were in need. In closing I must state that I have never in my life witnessed a better exemplar than Dr. Seesaran Her humility won her the hearts of people everywhere. I was often baffled as to why she was not called upon by the powers to be to play a more leading role in our society. She was a national treasure who deserved more. It is very commendable to become involved in a church or social group but we will make no positive contribution to society if we fail to live the quality of life that Dr. Seesaran led. This country has lost a great citizen who served her God and country with great distinction.

Counselling Column: Listening

Dear Rev. Paul,

Can you suggest a more tangible way to override my urge to value what I want to say more than what someone else wants to say? I need some help with this one. Thanks for your suggestions.

Dear Simone,

The secret is not to wait until you feel like listening to the other person. Chances are you may never want to hear his or her prospective. I am sure you have heard the expression "Listen up." You can learn to activate your interest by listening up by doing the following:

LOOK at the other person. Strictly speaking, you cannot truly listen to another person while you are doing something else at the same time. Put down or turn away from what you are doing or working on. Place your papers or pen on the desk. These body movements say "This can wait. You are more important." Such actions on your part indicate, physically and psychologically, that he/she is your top priority.

LIFT your eyebrows, establish eye contact, and put an expression of interest on your face. If your face is slack, your level of interest will be the same. If your eyes wonder your mind will too. The simple act of focusing on the other person's face and raising your eyebrows counteracts lethargy and activates your curiosity.

LEAN forward and adopt an attentive posture so you are literally and figuratively on the edge of your seat. By leaning slightly toward the other person you have just said with your body language, "I am here for you. You have my full attention." By reaching out and affirming the other person in this way, you are ready to listen to what he/she has to say and you would think less of what you want to say. As a matter of fact you can only respond by listening.

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Children's Corner: The KINGS of God's People

hen the children of Israel reached the Promised Land of Canaan they found other peoples living there. These peoples were ruled by kings. Joshua, who Moses named as their leader before his death, led his army into many battles and the first city they captured was Jericho. Joshua then divided the land among the eleven tribes except Levi who were the priests. Before Joshua died, he reminded the people to stay true to their God Yahweh and not to worship the Gods of any of the other peoples. But this was just what they did and they stopped following God's law.



When Samuel, the last of the Judges grew old the people asked him to appoint a king to govern them and fight for them. Samuel tried to explain that it was better for them to live under the rule of their God Yahweh who was their king but they insisted on having a king like the other peoples.

Samuel spoke to God who told him to find a king. He anointed Saul from the tribe of Benjamin. Saul was a successful soldier and warrior but when he disobeyed God and became ill, God told Samuel to find another king. Samuel went to Bethlehem of Judah and anointed David the son of Jesse. David was the shepherd boy who had killed Goliath and was also a soldier in Saul's army. When Saul and his sons died in the battle at Mount Gilboa, David became king. He expanded the kingdom and made Jerusalem the capital city before his death.

When David's son Solomon became King, he inherited a strong and wealthy kingdom but he was not faithful to God. Although he was remembered to be a wise king, he made friends with many other kings and rulers and allowed them to worship their Gods even in the magnificent temple he had built in Jerusalem.

When Solomon died, his son Rehoboam became king but he was not as wise as his father. The people turned against him and the Kingdom of the Israelites was split into the Kingdom of Judah in the south which he ruled and the Kingdom of Israel in the north that was ruled by Jeroboam. Both kingdoms turned away from worshipping their God Yahweh and began to worship other Gods with many of their king's encouragement.

Many prophets warned them that God will punish them for their unfaithfulness to God and for not being one people but they did not listen. About 150 years later, both kingdoms were destroyed, first Israel in 722 B.C. by the Assyrians and then Judah in 586 B.C.by the Babylonians. The chosen people of God were taken into captivity and exile. They had not only lost the Promised Land but their temple in Jerusalem was destroyed by the Babylonians. When the

Babylonians were defeated by the Persians, King Cyrus allowed the Jews to return to Jerusalem and gave them money to rebuild the temple.

The kingdom of Israel ceased to exist but the people who returned to Jerusalem returned to worship and serve their God. They prayed and lived with the hope that one day God would send a messiah an anointed one, a king who will be like David who would defeat all their enemies and returned them to the glory of their Promised Land. They believed that he would be a descendent of David who would be born in Bethlehem in Judah.

s we continue with this as our focus for 2009, be reminded of the fact that you must believe this and secondly, it is up to you each member of the family to make it happen.

We previously noted that the values, norms and traditions of a people are stored within the culture of its families and this wealth can be accessed and retrieved by descendents from generation to generation. However, each succeeding generation must contribute to this store in a meaningful and practical way which ensures that they add rather than waste this wealth. It is therefore required that the children and young of families be socialized to this wealth. Take time to identify and record your family's worth now, if you have not done so. It is in knowing the past and the rich history of your family that each and all family members can continually draw to refresh, renew and restore themselves.

This month we look at how 'errs' or mistakes can help to make all things new for the family.

As human beings, we all make mistakes but a human weakness is 'to play strong when we are wrong'. We usually therefore take a stubborn, aggressive position that can extreme to physical violence and brutishness. For those who lack the physique for arrogance, verbal arrogance or mouth power is utilized. We defend the indefensible or the unacceptable and instead of accepting responsibility for our words, actions, attitudes or behaviours, we opt often deliberately and defiantly to lay the blame squarely on the shoulders of others in the attempt to exonerate our self. Such behaviours occur in all human interactions whether social or personal but often the worst occurs within our families where we are best known and can seldom fool the others.

So take a minute to ask, what are our human foibles and mistakes? What are your human mistakes? And I dare ask you to ask yourself, what are my human mistakes? Are you perfect without any personality and personal-social flaws or weaknesses that make you prone to errors? To the extent or truthfulness of our answers and responses would be found the conflicts, disapproval or dynamics within your family relationships. Your errors therefore, and your attitudes that follow would reflect the state of your intra-family relationships.

It is therefore concomitant on each of us to accept that we all make mistakes, we all err and we must believe and accept that 'to err is human'. However, if we recall that the saying adds, 'to forgive is divine', it raises the question, who is to forgive? The answers are firstly, the one who has erred who must be remorseful and self-forgiving and secondly, those who were the victims or were offended or were the receivers or the err. In fact all have the duty and responsibility to forgive. As hard as this may be, forgiving our trespasses is as important as forgiving those who trespass against us. So where is this first demanded? In your family, because if you cannot forgive the errs of those in your family how hypocritical would it be to forgive others.

Each day brings new opportunities to any family or family member to forgive the errs or trespasses of other members. The challenge is to forgive but the question remains, are you willing to undertake this to make the changes that can benefit not just you but your family? Take time therefore, to do your part to bring pleasantness and peace that can make all things new for your family.



My classes which started off in May and ended in




